

## Senate Bill 322

Income Tax Subtraction Modification –Law Enforcement, Fire, Rescue, and Emergency Services Personnel (Hometown Heroes Act)

The Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) **OPPOSES** SB 322. This bill provides for subtraction modifications for the retirement income of individuals who are retired law enforcement officers or fire, rescue, or emergency services personnel of the United States, the State of Maryland, or local government.

In general, MACo argues that local tax structures should remain a local prerogative. MACo is concerned with the carryover county fiscal effects of this legislation and would prefer approaches that provide local autonomy to determine the best way to provide tax incentives, rather than those that mandate reductions in local revenue sources. This is just one of many bills introduced this session to reduce or adjust the income taxes paid by Maryland residents. The revenue effect of this bill, combined with other subtraction modification bills introduced so far this session, is simply not affordable as a statewide county mandate and could present substantial budget difficulties for any of a number of counties.

MACo suggests that consideration be given instead to providing state tax credits, which do not mandate the depletion of resources from all counties for education, public safety, and needed community services. State tax credits not only relieve counties from shouldering the burden of the costs for these benefits, but they also provide a benefit to eligible filers who do not itemize their deductions on their returns. Subtraction modifications only provide a benefit for those filers who opt not to take the standardized deduction, but state tax credits serve the entire targeted population.

Counties welcome the chance to work with state policymakers to develop flexible and optional tools to create broad or targeted tax incentives, but resist state-mandated changes that preclude local input. For these reasons, MACo urges the Committee to give SB 322 an **UNFAVORABLE** report.
