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## President's Message

*What if? There are perhaps no sadder words in the English language.*

What if? Some of us might say these words a few times in our lifetime. Some of us may say these words a few times a week. All of us have probably experienced a situation where things went wrong and afterwards when everything has settled down, we ask ourselves- What if? A police officer or firefighter might wonder how different things would have been if they had only arrived a few minutes earlier. An avoidance of a horrible traffic accident may cause a driver to think how lucky they were. Positive or negative outcomes are irrelevant to the question- What if?

Our experiences make us who we are. The good. The bad. Our successes. Our pain. We need each to define who we are. History marches on with no regard as to our own personal situations. It's left to us to make our paths. It's easy to spend time thinking what might happen and I believe that all of us should look to the future. However, it is equally important to look at what could have happened if things went in another direction and why all of us should be thankful that things turned out the way they have.

The same is true of families, countries and dynasties. And associations like SCOPA/AOA. Both have the privilege and burden of charting optometry's course. History does not care if optometry, SCOPA, or the AOA survive. When we sit and consider where we are now, I believe it is just as important for us to ask the above question- What if? What if history did not unfold the way it has? What if a few choices went unmade? No one knows for certain, but below is a brief look at an alternate version.

A concerned mother scours the internet for someone who can examine her 3 year-old's eyes. Living in a small, rural town in South Carolina, all she can find are ophthalmologists located in Columbia or Charleston. The driving time alone would take over two hours and she cannot take a day off of work for this. There is simply no local option. Each year, thousands of kids enter school without even having the opportunity to have their eyes examined due to lack of access. Those kids who are fortunate to live in an urban city have to wait months before they can be examined. When those kids are finally examined they are often fitted with glasses that do little to improve their visual clarity. Lack of eye-care access has caused diabetic retinopathy and glaucoma to reach epidemic levels throughout the state. Emergency rooms become the routine source of eye-care for those in need and the population suffers as a result. The eye-care situation has become increasingly untenable over the years and there are no solutions readily available.

So, if we turn the what if question to optometry, to the SCOPA/AOA; we find ourselves in a world that we do not recognize. What if a small group of refracting opticians chose not to fight for their profession against ophthalmology and in the process optometry was never created? What if Rhode Island optometrists do not decide to take the leap of optometry being a drug-less profession to allowing the use of pharmaceuticals in passing the first DPA law? What if West Virginia optometrists do not pass the first TPA law and optometrists never begin treating eye diseases? What if the AOA does not accomplish the goal of optometrists in Medicare and optometry is shut out of the realm of third-party payers? What if SCOPA does not pass its own TPA bill and in 2011 SC ODs are not able to practice at the same extent that we currently enjoy?

I'm certainly not saying things are perfect now. Nothing's perfect. Remember, our mistakes play just as much a part in shaping ourselves as our successes do. I will say that both SCOPA and AOA are forces of good for optometry. Both can do some things better, but as a whole, both advocate for optometry against all the forces marshaled against the profession in a way no other body can.

The Dee Dee Chewing Healing Award is given annually to an individual who provides direct care to children. Jennifer Lippens, OD, at the Montague Eye Center in Greenwood, South Carolina is this year's recipient. She provides vision care and glasses to dozens of Greenwood children each year.



The Montague Eye Center has been a provider partner since Healthy Learners Greenwood's first year in 2005.

When Dr. Lippens took over the practice a few years later, she expanded the relationship, establishing weekly appointment times so children's needs could be quickly met. When Medicaid changes forced vision providers in town to stop accepting Medicaid managed care plans, Dr. Lippens and her staff agreed to accept any child referred to them through Healthy Learners, regardless of their eye care coverage. In the 2010-2011 school year, she served 51 students at no cost to Healthy Learners, which was nearly one quarter of all students served in Greenwood.

President's Message *(Continues from Page 1)*

SCOPA is working along with the AOA to protect optometry's role as the primary eye-care provider. The initial ruling to classify a child's eye benefit as an examination is a positive step. Other aspects of the new health care law are potential dangers for exclusion and we must work to have optometry represented. Accountable Care Organizations and CO-OPs are examples of the changing face of health care and of work that needs to be done to secure optometry's position. South Carolina's Health Information Exchange is open to all to participate in and South Carolina optometrists are eligible for the Medicaid EHR incentive program. Only two other states can make that claim.

SCOPA continues to monitor for potential legislative and bureaucratic threats that might undermine our ability to practice, our access to patients, and our ability to be reimbursed at an equal level for services rendered. There are things that I hope we can accomplish over the next year that I believe will improve our current position.

SCOPA is working to maximize your member benefits. If it is possible to bring about an association health insurance plan, we will do so. This will be an ongoing project over the next few months as we explore different possibilities that we can offer SCOPA members.

SCOPA is actively seeking partnerships with local institutions such as the United Way, DHEC, local hospitals, BCBS, among others to help those who are in need of eye-care. SC Mission 2011 and 2012 are two examples of these collaborations. The Midlands Eye-Care Clinic is another. These endeavors could not have been accomplished on our own, but by working together we have the potential to make a more meaningful impact in the community.

In ten years, we can sit back and ask ourselves the what if question, but for now we all need to band together as one SCOPA and move forward to the future. Anything that we can accomplish is lessened when we lose members, when we pull in different directions, or when succumb to stagnation. We must come together as one to ensure optometry steels itself for the future. So that one day, far in the future, we will be together to ask ourselves — What if?

### South Carolina Health Information Exchange (SCHIEx)

SCHIEx is a statewide technology and policy framework that enables participating health care providers using electronic health record (EHR) systems to exchange clinical information for treatment and public health and quality reporting purposes. SCHIEx complies with Nationwide Health Information Network (NwHIN) specifications for secure data exchange and nationally recognized interoperability standards. This enables providers with systems that also comply with these standards to electronically share key clinical information such as medical histories, medications, allergies, diagnoses, and procedures once on-boarded to SCHIEx.

SCHIEx offers its Participants access to a single, statewide health information exchange (HIE) that can enhance coordination of patient care among providers, improve the quality and efficacy of care that a patient receives, improve patient safety, reduce medical errors and duplicative services, and enhance public health and disease detection and monitoring. While SCHIEx can help improve an individual patient's health care, it is voluntary. Patients who do not wish to have their information shared through SCHIEx have the right to opt out.

The SCHIEx core technology is built on a federated, network-of-networks model for electronic health information exchange. The SCHIEx federated architecture means each participating provider continues to maintain their clinical data, eliminating the need for a centralized clinical data repository. The SCHIEx core services and policies function such that Participants query and retrieve clinical information directly from other Participants involved in a patient's care. The network-of-networks model gives providers flexibility in how they participate. A provider or organization may choose to participate independently, as part of an integrated delivery network, or as a member of a health information exchange organization.

#### Relationship with the Office of the National Coordinator (ONC)

SCHIEx is the designated statewide Exchange in the Office of the National Coordinator (ONC) State Health Information Exchange Cooperative Agreement Program. As such, SCHIEx is required to implement a sustainable, statewide HIE for South Carolina health care providers that complies with national standards and helps address the HIE related requirements for each phase of Meaningful Use in the Medicare and Medicaid EHR Incentive Programs. For example, providers that participate in SCHIEx can share patient care summaries across unaffiliated organizations and exchange data with the Public Health Immunization Registry.

The State Health Information Exchange Cooperative Agreement Program is administered by the SC Department of Health and Human Services on behalf of the State of South Carolina. SCHIEx is governed by the Interim Governance Committee (IGC) appointed in 2009 by Executive Order. Its business and technical operations are performed by the SC Budget and Control Board Division of Research and Statistics.

#### SCHIEx Services

SCHIEx now has available the policy framework and technology services to support robust EXCHANGE- the discovery, query, and retrieval of clinical information by participating health care providers at the point of care. SCHIEx offers a Clinical Viewer for providers who prefer it to their own EHR system's external record display, access to the Surescripts/RxHUB Pharmacy Exchange (Surescripts fees apply), and exchange with the SC Department of Health and Environmental Control (SCDHEC) Public Health Immunization Registry. SCDHEC and SCHIEx are also working together to add electronic lab reporting (ELR) and syndromic surveillance to the SCHIEx technology platform. SCHIEx will soon complete development for DIRECT, a statewide provider directory and message transport capability that will allow SCHIEx Participants to securely push clinical messages to a known receiver. Like robust EXCHANGE, SCHIEx DIRECT messaging will comply with NwHIN standards.

#### SCHIEx Pilot Adopter Program

SCHIEx is inviting health care providers and organizations to apply for participation in the SCHIEx Pilot Adopter Program. The Program's intent is to include a range of providers and EHR systems. Pilot Adopters will receive a SCHIEx Subscription Fee Waiver for a 12 month period, commencing with the Pilot Adopter's initiation of the on-boarding process, and ongoing support from the SCHIEx technical and operations team. Applications are being accepted through September 1, 2011. More information and the SCHIEx Pilot Adopter Program application are available at [www.schiex.org](http://www.schiex.org).

#### Your Technology and SCHIEx

Providers who may be considering SCHIEx now or in the future should prepare by working with their current or prospective technology representatives/vendors regarding SCHIEx interoperability requirements. ONC certification does not necessarily mean a particular EHR product is currently able to address the national interoperability standards (IHE/HITSP) and technical requirements to participate in SCHIEx. The SCHIEx technical specifications are outlined in the SCHIEx Interoperability Services Guide located on the For Providers, Connecting to SCHIEx page at <http://www.schiex.org/connecting.php>. SCHIEx Interoperability experts are available to participate in calls with you and your technology representatives to discuss specific questions about on-boarding to SCHIEx.

### AOA Third Party Center Update

#### Physician Quality Reporting System - PQRS (Formerly PQRI) - Alert

##### Goal:

AOA Members should start completing and reporting PQRS measures as soon as possible.

##### PQRS:

- Focuses on quality of care
- Utilizes "evidence based" measures – professional input
- Reporting is financially rewarded
- Measures track processes and outcomes that theoretically
- Demonstrate improved patient care

##### What You Need to Know:

- No registration is required to participate
- PQRS is completely voluntary in 2012

##### Reporting Essentials:

- Utilize on Medicare patients
- Report with Quality Data Codes (QDCs) that include CPT II and G codes
- May report with paper based CMS 1500 claims
- May report with electronic 837-P claims
- Must report QDC codes (charge as \$0.01) on the same claim as a CPT I code
- Must report at least three measures, 50 percent of the time
- Frequent reporting will aid in meeting the 50 percent goal
- No penalty for more frequent reporting
- AOA recommends submitting QDC for all reportable cases

##### PQRS Reporting Hints:

- Track all claims submitted to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)
- PQRS line items will be denied for payment but should be noted on the EOB with N365
- N365: This procedure code is not payable. It is for reporting/information purposes only
- Ensure NPI is attached to each line item including QDC line items
- You may not resubmit a claim only to add QDC

##### PQRS Bonus Payment:

- 2011: 1.0 percent
- 2012: 0.5 percent
- 2013: 0.5 percent
- 2014: 0.5 percent

Bonus paid on all allowable Medicare charges for the respective year

##### PQRS Payment Penalties:

- 2015: 1.5 percent (based on performance in 2013)
- 2016 and each subsequent: 2.0 percent

### SCOPA Offers Condolences

It is with deep sadness that we inform you of the passing of two long time members of the SCOPA, Dr. Henry Vernon Sawyer and Dr. Ned P. Hobbs. Drs. Sawyer and Hobbs both made significant contributions to the Optometric profession on a local and national level, and will be deeply missed by all who knew them.

Dr. Ned Hobbs was a successful practicing Optometrist in Darlington for more than 64 years. He was an Honorary Fellow in the American Academy of Optometry. He served as a member of the S.C. Board of Examiners in Optometry for 19 years and as President of that board. He was very active in the S.C. Optometric Association where he had served in several offices including President. In 1966 he was selected "Optometrist of the Year" and in 1976 he was selected as a "Fellow in the S.C. Hall of Fame". He also served as President of the "Southern Optometric Association." On two occasions, he was nominated for "Optometrist of the South." In 1991, he ably served as President of the "American Optometric Foundation" as a life member. Dr. Hobbs was also a loyal member of the Pee Dee Optometric Society for many years and served as President. As a world traveler, he attended and lectured at eye clinics and hospitals in various countries. In 1991, he was awarded "World Optometric Ambassador."

Dr. Henry Vernon Sawyer was a retired optometric physician who practiced for over 50 years in the town of Marion, SC, and he served in many different capacities in local, state and regional optometric organizations. He was past president of the S.C. Optometric Association and served as secretary of the S.C. Board of Examiners in Optometry for 16 years. He also served as president of Southeastern Congress of Optometry during which time the need for continuing education was addressed and it became the first organization to require continuing education for re-certification of licensure annually, after which all other professions followed suit.
